



PROJECT BEACH CLEAN UK WIDE KIER UTILITIES

BIG Biodiversity Challenge Award Category: Innovation

Project overview

In conjunction with the annual Kier Group Environment Week (held this year between 4th – 10th June) the Kier Utilities environment team delivered 'Project Beach Clean' on beaches located on the coastline of the 4 home countries in which we work: England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales

What were the biodiversity conditions on site, prior to the enhancement?

Everyone with a degree of interest in the 'environment' will have been moved by Sir David Attenborough's Blue Planet 2 report highlighting the plight of our oceans and wildlife due to the amount of pollution found within the marine environment. Inspired by this, we decided as a team we should contribute in respect to trying to reduce this increasing problem and where better to start than in the areas in which we work. As a team we set out to organise several 'beach cleans' and engaged with our staff, schools, volunteers and the Marine Conservation Society.

What were the reasons behind this project?

It is estimated; 50% of the plastic we use are single use, 5400 wet wipes are being removed from the River Thames annually, 500 billion disposable bags are used worldwide every year, 5.6 million cigarette butts are dumped into the environment every year, 1 million plastic bottles are bought every minute around the world, 13 million tonnes of plastic are found in our seas and oceans every year. A focus of the 'beach clean' initiative was to improve the marine environment safeguarding many of our endangered species from plastic and other waste.

What were the biodiversity measures taken?

During the annual Kier Group Environment week, the Kier Utilities environment team visited the coastlines at Portobello (Scotland), Ballyholme (Northern Ireland), Mundesley, and Bridgwater Bay (England) and Porthcawl (Wales).

The team engaged with their respective clients (including several water companies), recruited volunteers, engaged with school children, Natural England, Wildfowl and Wetland Trust and the Marine Conservation Society as well as local councils who recovered the waste.

A total of over 115kg of waste was collected, this was waste that if not removed would have been washed back into the seas and oceans around our coast, or left to degrade on the beach, both of which massively impacts our marine environment and recreational spaces. It's worth noting that several items found have been datable and include a Smarties' lid c.1973 and beer crate c.1980, which illustrates how long these items have been in the environment.

As a team we know that our contribution was small, however through engagement and interaction with our clients, volunteers, schools, we believe we have made a difference to our seas and beaches. By entering this into the BIG Bio-Diversity Challenge, we hope to inspire others to do the same.

What was the motivation for carrying out the enhancement?
